<p><i>List descriptions, details, examples, and the challenges Loyalists faced.</i></p> <p><i>Include synonyms for Loyalist and related words from your vocabulary chart.</i></p> <p>1/3 of colonists were Loyalists, also called "Royalists," "friends of the government," "the King's friends," or "Tories"</p> <p>They remained loyal to the king of England.</p> <p>Reasons for loyalty:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Thought king had right to rule and his rules were fair 2. Afraid of soldiers 3. Their family lived in England 4. They were worried about a Patriot-led government <p>Native Americans (Iroquois and Seneca nations) and African-Americans were often Loyalists. The British gave slaves their freedom if they fought for the British.</p> <p>German troops ("Hessians") were paid by the British to fight.</p> <p>New York City was the Tory capital of America.</p> <p>Loyalists were lawyers, merchants,</p>	<p><i>List descriptions, details, examples and the challenges those remained neutral faced.</i></p> <p><i>Include related words from your vocabulary chart.</i></p> <p>1/3 of colonists were neutral (didn't take a side)</p> <p>Some changed sides depending on who was winning</p> <p>Religious groups like Quakers and Mennonites did not take sides (they were against fighting)</p> <p>Some people couldn't express their opinions, like slaves and indentured servants (they had to believe what their master believed)</p> <p>Some families split between colonies and England so they would be sure to be on a winning side!</p>	<p><i>List descriptions, details, examples, and challenges Patriots faced.</i></p> <p><i>Include synonyms for Patriots and related words from your vocabulary chart.</i></p> <p>1/3 of colonists were Patriots, also called "Rebels," "Liberty Boys," "Sons (or Daughters) of Liberty," "Colonials," and "Whigs"</p> <p>They wanted to be Americans and free from British rule.</p> <p>About 5,000 African-American soldiers were Patriots</p> <p>France, Spain, and Holland sided with the Patriots</p>
