Guided Notes – Lesson 4

How do the direct quotes from outside sources in the text reveal the author's point of view?

<u>Objective</u>: In this lesson you will learn to determine the author's point of view by analyzing the source and tone of direct quotes.

Steps:

- 1. Identify the source of the quote and ask, "What does this quote say about the character?"
- 2. Infer the tone of the quote.
- 3. Analyze the point of view of the author.
